The overuse of antibiotics has made them less effective and has led to the emergence of "superbugs". Bacteria are becoming resistant to the antibiotics we take and common antibiotics no longer work against these resistant bacteria. If we don't take antibiotics correctly today, we make it more likely they will no longer work in the future.

Antibiotics are medicines used to prevent and treat bacterial infections. Antibiotic resistance occurs when bacteria change in response to the use of these medicines.

Did you know?

- ⇒ The overuse of antibiotics makes them less effective
- Illness and treatment may take longer to recover from
- Infections will become harder to treat, and operations and other treatments will become more dangerous.
- ⇒ Shorter courses of antibiotics can sometimes be just as effective as longer ones

Most common infections don't get better any quicker with antibiotics. In many cases, your immune system will do a better job of clearing the infection without the need for additional treatment!

Always follow your healthcare professional's advice on how to take antibiotics safely and effectively. Together, we can protect the power of these essential medicines.
